In the Open event, it really was Norway's day. Heimdal BK won their first five matches, the most remarkable result being a near-blitz against the Swiss. In the last round of the day, they had to face the Belgians who once again, as we have seen before in recent years, had being gradually doing better and better. Their win over the Norwegians brought them back again into the runner-up position at the end of the day, just ahead of the French and the Swedes. After their heavy defeat, the Swiss recovered rather well but with the field quite close together, no team is in a position to relax yet.

In the Women's event, the Polish Women's Champions and the French dominated the day but the Dutch from the Crash team were always very close behind these two leading teams. In the penultimate round, the Dutch inflicted a heavy defeat upon the French and thus went to the top of the table – where they stayed overnight, ahead of both Poles and French, after beating the disappointing Danish in the last round. The defending champions from England will definitely have some work to do today.

KO stage - Pertinent parts of the Conditions of Contest

4.2.1 In the semi-finals, the higher ranked team from the round robin is designated as the Home Team. In the finals the brackets are fixed. For example, if no.1 loses the semi-finals, then their opponents take over no. 1 (or nos. 5 and 9 respectively) and the lowest number is designated as the home

The Home Team sits in the N/S position in the Open Room and in the E/W position in the Closed Room.

4.2.2 Tie breaking

In the semi-final and final stages, the team with a higher round robin ranking will be declared the winner.

4.2.3 Seating Rights

The home team selects in which stanza it wants to have seating rights; the opponents then have seating rights in the other stanza.

4.2.4 Line-up Procedure

The team without seating rights submits its line-up within 5 minutes after the previous round has ended, and the opposing team within 5 minutes thereafter. If the team required to submit its lineup first is late, the other team shall be allowed 5 minutes from the time of such late submission in which to submit its line-up.

Teams that infringe this regulation will be subject to a penalty of 1 IMP for the first occasion and 3 IMPs for the second occasion.



In this report, the main match to look at will be the Bridge Addaura Asd v. Israeli Champions match but we will start with an excursion to the women's event. They treated us to a slam straight away.

In Scandinavia, they have been (in)famous over the years for bidding and making slams that proved too much for lesser mortals. Right on the first board, they showed it again.

Four Diamonds showed a strong two-suiter with hearts so West had little option but to go for a serious forward move. The $\Diamond K$ behaved well so the only problem was the $\Diamond 9$. Once you decide to run the $\Diamond J$, you collect +980 if you manage to scoop North's $\Diamond 9$ if necessary. This way, Harding scored her slam for Norway.

Basically the same auction in the other room, but when declarer did not manage the trump suit the successful way, she was one down. Norway another +50 and 14 IMPs to open their account.

In the Open event, only one pair was in slam: Gerli-Maricic from Serbia. They produced an even more impressive auction.


That was +980 and 11 IMPs to the Serbians as well.



Over now to the Addaura-Israelis match.

On the first board, both pairs were nowhere near the slam but on board 2, their results varied.


Much action by E/W on hardly any values but losing 300 against a possible, albeit a shade lucky 3NT might be a good investment.

When East led a low heart into declarer's tenace, all looked well for Yekutieli. He won the $\heartsuit Q$ and played three rounds of spades. De Michelis won his $\clubsuit J$ and tried the $\heartsuit K$ with not very much hope, I think. However, when Yekutieli immediately won the $\heartsuit A$. he could no longer made the contract, although the $\clubsuit AQ$ were well placed for him. That was another +100 and 9 IMPs to the Italians.

In the Addaura – Israeli match, both Norths were in 3NT after a straightforward auction and both got the $\Diamond Q$ lead, taken with the $\clubsuit K$.

In the Open Room, Zatorski led the \$10 next which was allowed to run to West's \$Q. With West out of diamonds, that was the end of the defence. Addaura +400.

In the Closed Room, declarer played a low club to dummy's jack at trick 2. West took her \P Q and made the excellent return of a club. East's \P 7 forced the king in dummy and when the spade finesse was wrong for declarer, he thus had only 8 tricks available. Another +50 and 10 more IMPs to the Italians.

In the Contact Club Geneva v. BK Ekspert match, there was an accident.




In the Open Room, N/S took the sacrifice but defeating 4 would not have been too difficult. If North leads the $\Diamond A$, the heart ruff should be found by a correct defensive signal, as happened at most tables. Dummy's singleton should be helpful.

In the Closed Room, the auctions started the same way but when East bid on, he could not even escape the phantom zone. Down two, another +500 and 12 IMPs back to the Israelis.

Two boards later, the spotlights turned on the very powerful South hand...




What would you lead against (the equivalent of) 1NT by East, 3NT by West?

A few unlucky ones led a low club and declarer thanked the dummy for producing the $\P9$, which was called for and promptly won the first trick. The Italians were among the lucky ones here, adding another 12 IMPs to their tally.

Just before the end, the Israelis struck back in curious fashion.

AK/A in the minors was by no means enough to beat the contract. On the $\frac{4}{3}$ K lead. Sabbah made an overtrick for +990 to the Israelis.

This time, the reason for it was simple. As E/W, you have to put the brakes on early, otherwise you will end up too high. This happened to a number of pairs, all over the place, so Addaura chalked up another 12 IMPs when they stopped bidding in time and their opponents did not. They thus won the match 44-18 or 17.16-2.84 V.P.


WOMEN CHAMPIONS CUP

2024 Champions v Polish Women Champions

Out first look at the Women's event sees two serious contenders meeting head-to-head, with 2024 Champions (the English winners of last year's Champions Cup) taking on the Polish Women's Champions. We did not have to wait long for the first major swing.

The Poles had the perfect methods for this deal. They began with a multi-way Polish Club which is often, as here, a balanced 12-14. Ewa Morawska's jump to $3\diamondsuit$ was natural and invitational, so North landed in 3NT having given away as little information as possible. Could Sally Brock find the killing spade lead? No. She had no reason not to start with her long suit, and the AQ ran around to declarer's ace. Diana Nettleton won the second round of diamonds and switched to a low spade, but declarer finessed and, when East could not find the AJ amongst her wares, declarer had ten tricks. N/S +630.

For the 2024 Champions, Helen Erichsen began with a 1 response, denying a four-card major. When Anna Sarniak braved the vulnerability to get her spades into the game, there was no winning option for the English pair. They might have taken a small plus from $3\spadesuit$, but $4\diamondsuit$ looks like a safe enough spot. Not today: Sarniak led her club. Erichsen tried to cash three rounds of hearts to dispose of a spade loser, but East ruffed the third round. Declarer threw a spade anyway, and Joanna Zalewska duly delivered hr partner's club ruff. Two aces then put the contract one down. N/S -100 and 12 IMPs to Poland Champions.

South was dealt an even stronger minor suit on the next deal and, once again, it was the Poles who earned the plaudits...

North's $1\diamondsuit$ response showed hearts. Ericsen alerted both $1\clubsuit$ (because it might have been only a doubleton) and $3\clubsuit$, so perhaps there is something about the auction that is not clear. Certainly, that hand looks a bit good for a non-forcing $3\clubsuit$ rebid. No harm done, though, as Brown had enough to bid 3NT anyway, which looks likely to be the contract of choice.

West won the diamond lead with her king and returned the suit, so declarer was soon claiming 11 tricks. N/S +460.

Morawska apparently had a forcing 2^{4} rebid available, and she then committed her side past 3NT at her third turn. It did not then take long for Aleksandra Jarosz to install her partner in slam.

West is almost endplayed at trick one. A trump lead does not actually give anything away, but declarer draws trumps and then plays the $\Diamond A$ and a second diamond. Winning with the $\Diamond K$, West has then either to concede a trick to declarer's $\spadesuit Q$ or set up a heart winner in dummy for a second spade discard. Either way, declarer has 12 tricks. At the table, Nettleton led a heart at trick one and Morawska was soon claiming 12 tricks. N/S +920 and another 10 IMPs to Poland Champions.

The rest of the boards were mostly flat, except for a partscore deal on which the Poles bid to game in both rooms. That was a late lifeline for the defending champions, but the Poles ran out winners by a score of 23-9.

Contact Club Geneva v Heimdal BK

The final pre-lunch match on the opening day in Latvia threw together a mouthwatering encounter between two teams of heavyweight champions. The Geneva club is represented here by Switzerland's multiple world championship winning team, while the pride of Norwegian bridge is here playing for the Heimdal club. The Norwegians have started with two big wins and lead the field with 34.15/40 VPs. The Swiss lost their first match, but 17.16 VPs from Match 2 has lifted them into fourth place in the early going.

Pierre Zimmermann decided that the South hand was worth only a competitive raise after East's takeout double, and no one else had anything to contribute. Game is no better than a moderate proposition, but the layout of the defensive cards enabled Franck Multon to make ten tricks. N/S + 170.

Geir Helgemo was more ambitious in the replay...

Helgemo's 2% showed a constructive (or better) three-card spade raise. Kaare Bogo advanced with a $3\diamondsuit$ game try and Helgemo, with a fourth trump and a very promising




diamond holding, jumped to game.

The defence started with the \P A and a second club to dummy's king. Two rounds of trumps then revealed the loser in that suit. Bogo continued with the \heartsuit K, ducked, and the \heartsuit Q. Nowosadzki won with the \heartsuit A and exited safely with the \heartsuit J. Declarer ruffed and, now that the rounded suits had been eliminated, he exited with a trump. Piedra was up to the task and knew he did not have to open the diamonds, so he exited with a heart, giving declarer a useless ruff-and-discard. Unfortunately for the defence, the diamond layout was such that declarer could play the suit for no loser anyway. Bogo duly cashed the \diamondsuit K, bringing down the jack, and finessed against East's \diamondsuit Q for his tenth trick. N/S +620 and 10 IMPs to Heimdal BK.

Sometimes it just seems like one team knows when to zig and when to zag. The Norwegians were playing in what Zia called 'Heat 1' and they could do no wrong...

Is this such an unexpected auction? Indeed, this is exactly what happened at one table in five of the six matches in the Open event. Pierre Zimmermann made eight tricks: N/S+110.

At five of the 12 tables, after the same start, North continued with 2NT at his second turn, and South duly raised to the no-trump game. With the A onside for declarer, there was no defence.

At the other table in our match, there was a third variation...

Once Bogo's system allowed him to stretch to a 2% response, the destination was never in doubt. There were just three aces to lose. N/S +620 and another 11 IMPs to Heimdal BK.

The one thing that spectators were not expecting when they sat down to watch this match was a blitz, but that's how things turned out. The Norwegians ran out 56-5 winners (20-0 in VPs) over their illustrious opponents. With a total of 54.15/60 from their first three matches, Heimdal BK have already opened up a gap of more than 15 VPs on the field. Can anyone catch them?

The first round after the lunch interval turned out to be much more quiet than this morning's opening round. Yet, there was one similarity that came to light right at the beginning: a slam not bid everywhere. I was looking at the women's match between ASD Reggio Emilia and BAB Riga. The Latvians had little trouble in reaching a good slam.

A few cuebids and an easy enough +1010. In fact, $6 \spadesuit$ is a good spot to be in but the hand is one of those rare cases of five or seven. If the spades don't break well, (2-2, a singleton honour in South would not help you because of the lack of entries to take the finesse, you would probably go down in six. Strangely enough, one declarer who ended up in the grand did not believe his luck (apparently) and managed to go down two.

At the other table, the Italians joined the happy few.

On a spade lead from North, you might well go down in 3NT. If South leads a diamond and you misguess, 3NT is in jeopardy even with East as declarer. Heart lead from South to North's ace and a spade back, followed by a low diamond gives declarer the same headache. Still, 3NT was made just more often than not but another popular contract was in clubs. Five Clubs was already too high but the Addaura Italians had a curious misunderstanding.
