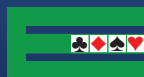

On Chediak's defense, declarer can prevail after cashing the $\diamond K$ but must exit the dummy via the heart suit, guessing to put in the $\heartsuit 9$ or cover if South plays the jack.

This time, the contract was not cold, but it does hinge on the opening lead and subsequent defense. Chediak chose a third-best diamond, which would ensure down one, but South must switch to a heart at trick two. Sivertsvik won with the ace and cashed the king – which looks like suit preference for hearts – and continued with the 8, North playing the 2, then 9.

Declarer led the $\clubsuit 8$ to the 9, king and 3 to run the $\spadesuit 9$, losing to the king. Chediak exited with the $\heartsuit Q$, overtaken by South with the ace. She returned the 9, won by declarer. Grzejdziaak cashed the trump ace, then the $\clubsuit A$ (South contributing the 6) before advancing a sneaky $\clubsuit 10$. Chediak did not cover, and declarer made a fine play to let it ride, discarding the losing $\heartsuit 10$ to make $2\spadesuit$.

The lead at the other table was the $\heartsuit Q$, overtaken by the ace. The top two diamonds were cashed. Helness can make now by finessing in clubs, but took a similar line of play and finished down one.

This year, the VIKING GIRLS return to defend their title, but without Tonje Aasand Brogeland. An impressive 50 teams from 35 countries have entered the event.

FROM COURTROOMS, TO BRIDGEROOMS, TO BACKROOMS: IDA GRÖNKVIST'S GRAND SLAM LIFE

At 30 years old, Ida Grönkvist is living several lives at once. She works as an Acting Associate Judge at the Svea Court of Appeal in Stockholm and is a European and World Bridge Champion. She is also a member of the EBL Executive Committee.

If you're struggling to find time for bridge in your busy life, Ida has some advice on how to keep pursuing your career while winning the Venice Cup.

Let's start from the very beginning. You learnt to play bridge at age 11 in your family, and bridge has shaped a big part of your life. Can you imagine what your life would have been like without bridge?

I would have missed out on so many things. Through bridge I've met some of my best friends, my future husband, and the game itself has helped me develop skills in other areas: communication, logical thinking, learning English... I would be a different person today if it wasn't for bridge. I also feel that what I've learned through bridge has been useful in my job.

Apart from evaluating the partner's performance, how are being a judge and bridge player comparable?

Both environments can be quite high-pressure, with unknowns to identify. In both, you have to stay calm, present, and focused on everything that's going on. You have to analyze the behavior of the people around you and make a lot of decisions quickly. In the courtroom, you have to assess evidence from what people are saying and draw logical conclusions. And the same applies to bridge: you are assessing the evidence, the cards people are playing, the bids they have made.

Many people struggle to balance work and hobbies, let alone competing at international level. How do you manage to excel in both your legal career and bridge?

For sure it's difficult, I'm not going to lie. You have to set priorities. I'm not able to attend all the tournaments I would like

to, and I have to be very strict when it comes to practicing. So far I've been very lucky, as at work they fully understand my passion for bridge. Whenever I go to my boss to ask for some odd vacation time in the middle of a stressful period, he or she is always like: 'Let me guess, another bridge tournament!'

But of course it comes with sacrifices. I'm not able to see my friends as much as I would like to. It also means that I have to accept that in bridge, despite being able to compete at a high level, I can't be at the very top.

Don't you feel that your status as European and World Champion puts you at the very top?!

There is still a difference between me and someone who can play bridge all the time, and I have to accept that maybe I won't reach my full potential. But I'm happy this way.

And you also find time to take part in bridge politics. How did you decide to join the EBL board?

I hadn't thought much about it until I was approached and asked about running for the Executive Board. It was the late Jan Kamras, former EBL and WBF President, who got me interested in it, and I'm very happy about this because it made me understand the bridge world from a different perspective. It also gave me much more confidence in the EBL as an institution. When you are able to see from the inside how much quality work people put in, how much thought lies behind all of these decisions, it makes you feel that bridge has a future. So I'm very, very happy that I was able to be on the board and learn so much.

You are Chair of the EBL Youth Committee and member of the EBL Women's Committee. Which initiatives have you worked on and what are the next steps?

Regarding the Women's Committee, in these years we have discussed a lot of matters together. Oryah Meir is of course the driving force behind everything we do. We have worked on the creation of the Women's category for the European Champions' Cup, and then the online training program, which has been my main involvement, mainly in finding the expert players. And of course also these Women's Online Championships... I am sorry that I can't take part as I am currently on vacation in Asia.

We now have a project together with the WBF Women's Committee to involve more women in becoming international tournament directors. There is a gender gap: international tournaments would benefit from having more female TDs, so we are trying to incentivize them.

As Chair of the Youth Committee, I've tried to connect the Women's and Youth committees. In the Youth Committee, we have been focusing on creating play opportunities between face-to-face Championships. The 2nd Online Youth Team Championships is starting soon, with a new format compared to the previous edition. We have worked a lot on developing a flexible, modern schedule that makes it easier to participate.

Are you running again for the EBL board at the elections in June?

No, because I have to prioritize other parts of my life. Maybe I will come back in the future.

IDA'S BRIDGE ACHIEVEMENTS

2007

At 12 years old, she played her first European Youth Championship, representing Sweden.

2011

At 16, she won her first international medal: bronze at the European Youth Championships - U21 teams, playing for Sweden.

2014

She won her first World title at the World Youth Championships - U21 teams.

More Youth European and World medals followed: gold (2017, 2018, 2019), silver (2015, 2018), bronze (2017).

2019

At 24, she claimed her first European and World titles outside the youth category. She won both the European Mixed Team Championships and the World Women's Team Championships in the same year!

2024

Silver medal at the World Bridge Games (her favourite competition), Women's Teams.

2025

Gold medal at the European Transnational Championships, Mixed Teams.

Speaking of differences between males and females, does it make sense to have a female category for a mind sport?

Even though there are some differences between the male and female brain, there is no scientific evidence that suggests that men have abilities that will make them better bridge players. There are, however, huge social differences. We know for a fact that historically, fewer women have pursued bridge (or other sports or careers) at the top level, because they were expected, for example, to stay home with the family, and they were not expected to be ambitious in this way. So for now, women need to be encouraged and have an arena where they can compete. That's why having a women's category is very important. The mixed category too, as it is very popular and helps female players access open events. Anyway, we now finally have some female players who are making it to the very top level. My personal opinion is that the long-term goal should be to have no women's or mixed categories at all.

About the Mixed category: you won the gold medal in Poznan at the European Championships, playing with your life partner. Do you have any suggestions for ladies who would like to play with their life partner? It can be a delicate situation...

It can definitely be a delicate situation! I think the key is to maintain a professional approach: when you're at the table, think of them as your bridge partner, not your life partner. That said, it's a great opportunity: you get to spend more time together with someone you already share your life with, you have plenty of chances to discuss bridge and techniques outside of tournaments, and ultimately it can be a very fun experience.

How do you practice, given that you don't have much time? What do you recommend to players who have a limited amount of time?

Prioritizing is a big part of it, but it's important to understand that playing the hands is not enough. Of course it's important to play, but in order to improve you need to do additional work, especially analyzing the system and spending extra time on it, schedule meetings with your partner where you talk about the system.

Do you recommend any bridge apps?

I am a huge fan of Cuebids because of how easily accessible it is. I also combine it with some online meetings and the bidding room on BBO, because I feel that when you and your partner are bidding at the same time you are able to be more focused. There are also the Bridge Master deals, which I actually do before bridge championships to warm up.

What are three bridge conventions that shouldn't be missing from any pair's system card?

Gazzilli, Keycard, and Splinters.

What do you hope the participants of the Online Women's Championship will take away from this experience?

This championship is a great first step towards trying a face-to-face international championship. If they enjoy it, they should consider going to a live event organized by the EBL or the WBF. Travel, enjoy, learn something in bridge that you can't learn in any other way. I encourage them to go and play live!

What are your bridge, professional and personal projects for 2026?

My projects for this year are getting selected for the Swedish national team to play in Latvia, playing the NABC in the summer, and then two weeks in Katowice for the World Bridge Series. My biggest goal is getting married: we'll see if I manage!

NORDEN tops day one of qualifying Swiss

The third European Online Women's Teams Championship is underway, with the first of two days of Swiss matches complete. After 40 boards, Team NORDEN (Lone Bilde, Ann Karin Fuglestad, Liv Marit Grude, Marianne Harding, Torild Heskje, Bodil Nyheim Oigarden, Helle Rasmussen and Gunn Tove Vist) are leading the field with 68.57 VPs. In second place are the BELGIAN WOMEN (Antonella Couteaux, Nicole Marechal, Marie-Francoise Stas, Dominique Stuyck and Caroline Vandebossche) with 61.94 VPs.

NORDEN won all their matches by double digits. In their set against ICELAND1 (Alda Gudnadottir, Maria Haraldsdottir Bender, Harpa Fold Ingolfssdottir, Arngunnur Jonsdottir, Svala Palsdottir and Rosemary Shaw), they lost IMPs on six boards but picked up big swings on three, including this deal:

A pretty straightforward auction to the top spot. Declarer won the fourth-best spade lead with the singleton ace and ran the ♦J. She next unblocked the clubs, returned to hand with the ♦K and finished with 11 tricks for +460.

At the other table, Rasmussen's preempt, showing spades and a four-card minor, put more pressure on North-South and talked them out of a nine-trick game into a hopeless one.

The defense started with three rounds of hearts, East pitching the ♣9 and 5. West does best now to play a spade, but she persisted with another heart, ruffed by East with the ♦7 and declarer overruffing with the 8. Declarer can get out for down one at this point, double dummy, but played the ♦A and another. East sat back and scored her trump queen for down two and 13 IMPs to the leaders.
