The Round of 32 saw several teams prevail by large margins to advance to the next stage. The most dramatic finishes came in the matches Daisy Chain vs **Israel Blue**, which ended with the young Israeli team just 6 IMPs ahead, and Hobaa vs Justjump, with **Hobaa** closing only 2 IMPs ahead.

Other qualifiers to the Round of 16 were: **Zimmermann, Dyson, Eler, Ashe, Overdeck, Bridgescanner, De Botton, Mavericks, Knottenbelt, Bianchi, Secrets of Secrets, Bridge Trainer, Altshuler, SPS Poland.**

In the Swiss Cup, Nikos (62.37), **Fajerwerki** (61.54), and **New Broom** (57.23) are leading the qualification stage. Tonight, the teams will be split into semifinal A (36) and semifinal B (the rest). Since the maximum number of drop-ins is equal to 8 (the losers of the round of 16), **the minimum number of teams who will join Semifinal A is equal to 28.**

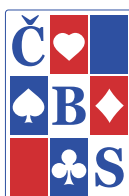
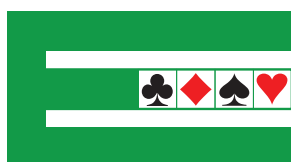

For the 1st stanza, the team **without seating rights** must submit its line-up no later than 9.00 a.m.

For the 2nd / 3rd / 4th stanzas, the team **without seating rights** must submit its line-up no later than 10 minutes after the official ending time of the previous stanza.

For the 1st stanza, the team **with seating rights** must submit its line-up no later than 9.05 a.m.

For the 2nd / 3rd / 4th stanzas, the team **with seating rights** must submit its line-up no later than 15 minutes after the official ending time of the previous stanza.

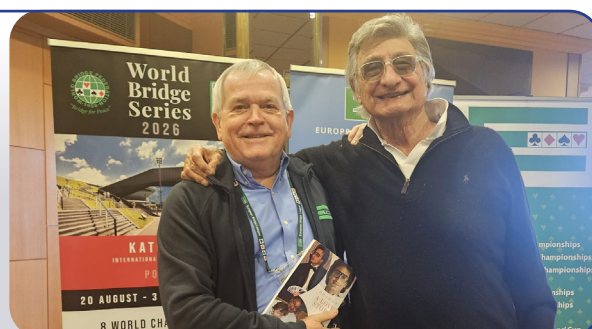

⚠ SWISS CUP FORMAT

The event is divided in three phases: qualification, semifinals, final.

a) Qualification

It will be played over 8 rounds of 14 boards each, with Swiss movement, on February 13th and 14th. After day one, the starting teams will be joined by the drop-in teams coming from the Open Teams Championship. Those teams are a maximum of 16 (the losers of the round of 32) and will be receiving a carry-over equal to the team placed 21st. They will not be paired against each other in the fifth round of the Swiss.

At the end, the teams will be split in semifinal A (36) and semifinal B (the rest). Since the maximum number of drop-in is equal to 8 (the losers of the round of 16), the minimum number of qualifiers from the qualification stage is equal to 28. The qualifiers will be receiving a linear carry-over score equal to 20 VP to the best ranked, and down to 0 to the last. The drop-in teams will be receiving a carry-over equal to the team placed 11th.

b) Semifinals

It will be played over 8 rounds of 14 boards each, with Swiss movement, on February 15th and 16th. The drop-in teams will not be paired against each other in the first round of the Swiss.

After day one, the teams in semifinal A will be joined by the drop-in teams coming from the Open Teams Championship. Those teams are a maximum of 4 (the losers of the quarter-finals) and will be receiving a carry-over equal to the team placed 15th. They will not be paired against each other in the fifth round of the Swiss.

The teams playing semifinal B will be receiving a linear carry-over score equal to 5 VP to the best ranked, and down to 0 to the last.

At the end, 20 teams qualify to Final A: a minimum of 16 from semifinal A, 2 from semifinal B, and a maximum of 2 from the Open Teams Championship.

The qualifiers will be receiving a linear carry-over score equal to 20 VP to the best ranked, and down to 0 to the last.

The drop-in teams receive a carry-over equal to the team ranked 3rd. The winner of semifinal B receives a carry-over equal to the team ranked 12th, while the team classified 2nd in semifinal B receives a carry-over equal to 0.

The teams not qualified to final A will be playing Final B (either Swiss or BAM: TBD).

c) Final

It will be played over 7 rounds of 8 boards each, with Swiss movement, on February 17th.

The drop-in teams will not be paired against each other in the first round of the Swiss.

In each case, the opponents of the drop-in teams will be drawn randomly.

Championship specials

The new **dealing machines** used to duplicate the boards for the European Winter Transnational Championships are sold for **€2650**. The **cards** played at last year's world championship are sold for **€80/100 decks**.

THE EATERY

● U Uranie 18, 170 00 Praga 7-Holešovice

“ The Eatery was founded in October 2018 by Chef Pavel Bycek. Located in the Holesovice district of Prague the restaurant with its open Kitchen is known for Modern European and Czech cuisine, using seasonal produce.

Everything was great, including the service. My favourites were the Eel, the crispy tripe with thousand island sauce (inspired), the smoke pork tongue with horseradish radish espuma, brioche dumplings and pickled mustard seeds and I also loved the celeriac carpaccio and the caramel mousse.



RESTAURANT ALMA

● V Jirchářích 150/8, Nové Město 110 00, 1 Praha 1

“ Restaurant Alma in Prague opened in 2023. The concept is seasonal, locally sourced cuisine. It is in a renovated historic building and has an open kitchen.

I went for the celeriac starter- outstanding. Followed by the sirloin steak which was served with a beef jus. It was a beautiful piece of meat and cooked perfectly, the rosti and salad complimented it perfectly.

Sea buckthorn sorbet for dessert- stunning. I also tried the carp salad- amazing. This is a wonderful restaurant although very slow,

I was sitting North, facing a pair playing an unusual system. East opened 1♦. Me and Cédric passed throughout the auction. West bid 1♥, artificial: either a natural hand or a 13+ HCP relay.

East then bid 3♣, showing 4 hearts, singleton club, 5 diamonds and 9-12 HCP. West bid 3♠ natural and East 3NT. So we now knew the exact shape of East's hand: 2-4-6-1. Cédric led the ♥A, I discouraged with a small card and Cédric, knowing that declarer held a singleton club, shifted to a low club for my King. I then returned a spade round to dummy's ♠AK9872.

That was the killing switch. The only layout where it could go wrong was if declarer held ♦KJxxxx and two small spades. But the auction said otherwise.

Great defense, Thomas! Here's a charger for your phone.

Among all the teams in the Championship, one strikes terror into the heart of anyone who has to type it: 2EK04FAZOKLUB0.

One tiny mistake and the system will refuse to move forward. If for any reason copy-paste is not an option, we start crying.


A handful of K's, sure. You can't deny that to a Polish team. But the O-or-maybe-0 situation? That's just cruelty.

So we're not in the best of moods when one of their players walks up and asks for a team name change. No, not to something readable. They got it wrong themselves when they registered! They need 2EK04FAZOKLUB0 to become 4EK02FAZOKLUB0.

Fotis, our IT manager, takes a zen breath. He makes the change as requested. But now it's time. Deal for deals.

“ I was sitting North. West opened 1NT (weak, 10-14 HCP). With 17 HCPs, 5 spades and five diamonds, I decided to pass. East bid 4♥, pass, pass and now it was back to me. I thought: if my partner has even just 2 spades, that's a 3-3 split with honors. I still have chances. If he has more, even better. And if he has none at all, we can always escape to 5♦. So I bid 4♠. East doubled. West ran to 5♥. Down 3.
In the other room, the contract was 5♠, down 1. 8 IMPs for us!

N0t b4d f0r a team we c4n't even sp3ll!

They shuffled around some after the last set, with Sayin Abim dropping to ninth after a small loss to SV Bridge Club and Secrets of Secret taking over sixth place after defeating Bridge Trainer 20–12, dropping them to seventh place. The match between the No. 1 and No. 6 spots was on LoveBridge.

Holding the ace-king in a suit and another ace, everyone opens the bidding, right? The South hand here could be an exception. Your honours are in your short suits, and your two four-card suits are anaemic.

North led the ♦K. Their card reads ace from A–K at this level. Dummy played low, South followed with the ♦8, declarer the ♦4. North continued with the ♦A: ♦6, ♦9 and ♦Q. This still looks like spade suit preference, if West only has ♦Q 4 then South's holding is ♦10 9 8 5 2; they would have opened 1♦ and could have carded differently. Or West has ♦Q 10 5 4 2 and South holds ♦98. Playing the ♦9 then ♦8 would be more clear. North exited with a club and West took the rest.

West led the ♥J, overtaken with the queen for a trump switch. West won and played another heart, South taking the ace. He played two rounds of diamonds, coming to hand with a spade and ruffing a third round. The next spade was ruffed by West. He could now tap dummy with another heart and score his two high clubs, and his partner eventually gets the ♦J for down two and 2 IMPs to De Botton, but there was a ruling on the board.

Maybe North's double was a game-try but South, with three trump winners, was inclined to pass. North must lead a trump or club to hold West to eight tricks. When the ♠Q was led, declarer can win with the ace and ruff a spade, re-entering dummy twice in diamonds for two more spade ruffs. On the third diamond, South can ruff in with a natural trump trick, but the contract is cold.

It looks like West's redouble was a transfer to hearts, East accepting and then doubling the final 4♠ contract. Right idea, wrong lead: the ♥J allowed North to make five for +990 and 17 IMPs to Knottenbelt.

Stanislaw Golebiowski found the best lead of the ♠2, but declarer would also be in trouble after either red-suit lead. West won with the king and returned the ♠J, allowed to win. ROUND OF 32 – STANZA 2

OVERDECK V PROMAX

MARC SMITH

Overdeck (Italy, Portugal, USA) finished the three-day qualifying stage with a 22-IMP win and so sailed through to the knockout stage in 16th place. Their opponents in the Round of 32, Promax (Israel, Poland, Latvia) also seemed to be heading for today's knockout rounds, but a 20-IMP loss in their final match on Thursday left them clinging on, just scraping through in 32nd place, less than a single VP from elimination.

Still, everyone starts from zero today, and it was Promax who led by 3 IMPs (29-26) after the first of the four 14-board stanzas.

We start with a bidding problem. Sitting North, with both sides vulnerable, you hold:

John Overdeck showed his two-suited hand with a 2♦ cue bid, and Mikhail Krasnosselski's support double promised three spades. When South's 4♠ came back to Aldo Giovanni Gerli in the East seat, it was far from clear which side was bidding to make. It will be right to bid on if either contract is making, so the Italian quite sensibly took the insurance by bidding a fifth heart. Fortunately for him, North/South also did not know who was sacrificing, so Gerli was allowed to play for 50s.

The defence began with the ♦A, a spade to the ace, and another spade. With the spades marked 6-3, declarer was always going to get the trumps wrong, so the defenders duly made a trick in each suit to set the contract two. N/S +100

Antonio Palma did not open the North hand, so the auction began with a Multi 2♦ from Andrea Manno, showing a weak two in one of the majors. Palma's double of West's 2♥ overcall showed a willingness to compete if his partner's suit was spades. Manno duly did compete over 3♥ and now Palma raised to game. E/W correctly judged that they could not make 11 tricks in hearts. With a passed hand facing a weak two opening, it was also far from clear that N/S could make game, so no one was even vaguely tempted to save.

Martins Lorencs had a number of winning opening leads, but the ♥A was not one of them. He continued with the ♣A and a second club, Manno ruffing in hand to play a spade to the jack and king. Back came a diamond, declarer rising with the ace, dropping West's ♦K. When he played a trump, Manno thought for a long time before eventually concluding that taking a winning finesse against ♠10-x-x in the West hand did not help, so he rose with the ♠A, dropping East's ten. A diamond went on the ♣K, so declarer could now ruff the diamonds good and return to dummy with a heart ruff. That was N/S +420 and 8 IMPs to Overdeck.

Now Bethers switched to the ♥Q, declarer winning with the ace. Palma scored four diamond tricks but, with the hearts now wide open, he had to settle for eight tricks. N/S +120.

In the replay, Krasnosselski decided that the North hand was worth a jump to 2NT. Feofanov also noticed that his side was vulnerable, so he inevitably raised to game. Suspecting he may be in trouble whenever he was on lead, Gerli opened with an aggressive ♥Q. Declarer ducked, and put in the ♥J on the continuation, so West won with the ♥K and cleared the suit. A spade to the queen lost to East's ace, and Gerli returned the suit, dummy winning with the ♠9.

Krasnosselski played three rounds of diamonds, picking up East's queen, then cashed the ♣A before leading a fourth round of diamonds to dummy. But, Gerli had not come this far to let the contract through now, and he duly disposed of the ♣K on the fourth round of diamonds. Declarer could do no more than cash the ♠K and concede one down. N/S -100 and 6 IMPs to Overdeck.

There was little in second half of the set, although the Multi created some mayhem on the next deal...

With no spade ruff and the ♦K onside for them, N/S can make 3♥, whilst the 3-3 diamond break and the presence of the ♣10 in the West hand means that E/W can make 4♣. At this table, East chose not to reveal his long suit and thus West had no real chance of choosing the right contract.

Bethers did bid his clubs. When South competed with a pass-or-correct 3♥, West here also doubled and, again, East responded in his spade fragment. Either player might have been mindful of South's willingness to play in spades, but both East and West decided that the 4-3 was their best chance of a plus score. Oops! The 3-3 fit was not a great success Declarer managed to scramble seven tricks, so that was also N/S +200 and a flat board.

A flat second half meant that Overdeck won a low-scoring set 23-14. That left them with a 6-IMP lead going into the second half of the contest. All still to play for.

AGAINST THE CLOCK

MARK HORTON

When you are covering a tournament, you don't have much time for reflection – copy has to be delivered as quickly as possible after play has been completed. However, the deals tend to stick in your subconscious, and every now and then you have a lightbulb moment.

Let's revisit this deal from Round 3 of the Teams qualification:

I introduced this deal with the observation that with some good guesswork in the spade suit you have all the tricks. However, at this level players don't like to rely on guesswork.

I can't be sure about the meaning of 3♣ – it was certainly asking about something.

North led the ♥K and declarer did not divine the spade position, finishing three down, -300 but losing only 5 IMPs when 6NT failed in the replay.

It occurred to me that having taken the ♥K declarer would have cashed four clubs, discarding dummy's ♥10. When North turns up with a singleton, declarer has some information to work with. Given that you will need four diamond tricks in any event, you must assume the suit is 3-3 (barring ♦J10 doubleton). It is now likely that North has four spades in a 4-5-3-1 and if they include the ♠Q you can only score three tricks by finessing. However, you know North has the ♥Q, and if he also holds the ♠Q (not unlikely after the overcall) four rounds of diamonds will squeeze him in the majors. Given that we know declarer went three down we can be reasonably certain that declarer played for this position, finessing the ♠10 at trick 11, South winning and returning a heart which gave North the last two tricks.

One of my favourite principles is that when you are declaring a contract of 3NT it does not matter how you arrive at nine tricks. Taking the last nine is just as good as scoring the first nine. From a defender's point of view, you are looking for five tricks, and one of the things you need to ask yourself is where they are coming from.

After cashing the ♠7 North switched to the ♣8, but declarer took dummy's ♣A, cashed dummy's diamonds, came to hand with a heart and played two diamonds, claiming when South discarded the ♣K, +600.

North could be sure from the first two tricks that there were four spades to cash. On this layout you need to switch to a club at trick three. Then South can discard a spade on the fourth diamond.

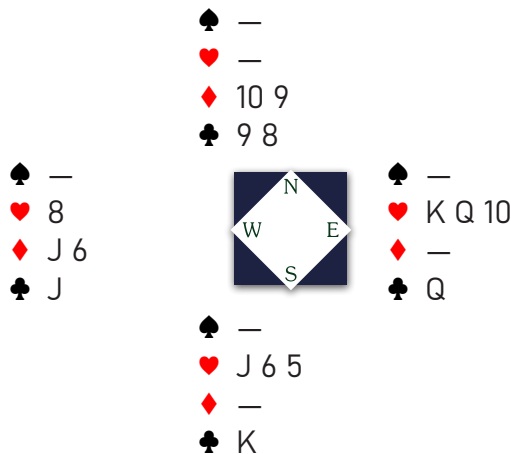

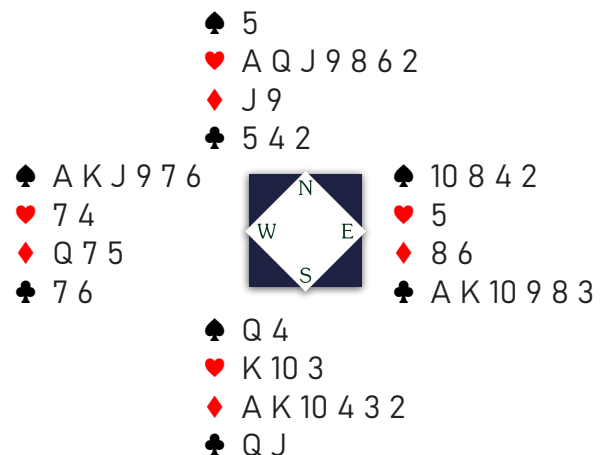

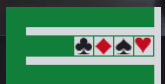
