

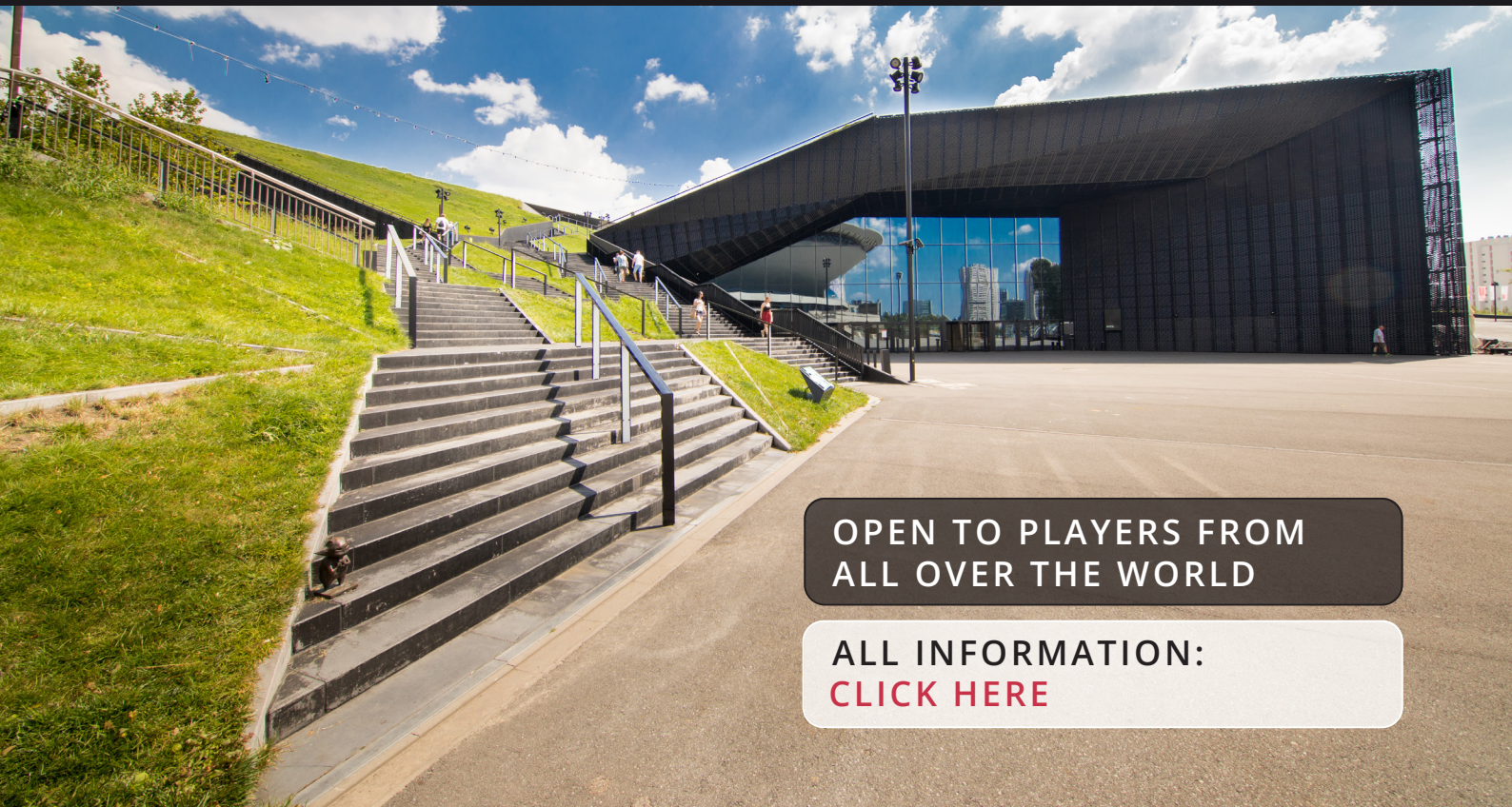

I believe in Miracles

Sooner or later you will inevitably encounter a situation where the prospects of a successful outcome are slim. I spotted a couple of deals from the final qualifying sessions where declarer's prospects were poor, but the great shuffler had delivered a layout where it was possible to succeed:

Several pairs bid 6♥ with the EW cards (four making it doubled). It's best to play it from the West hand, avoiding an awkward looking diamond lead from South.

However, on three occasions East became declarer after an opening bid of 1NT and (absent an intervention by South) and a transfer by West. All three declarers received the lead of the ♦10 and went down when they played dummy's ♦7. If declarer concludes that South is unlikely to be leading away from the ♦K the alternative is to win with dummy's ♦A. Now there is only one layout that allows 12 tricks to be recorded – South must hold a singleton ♣K and a void in trumps. You cash the ♣A and can then play three more rounds of the suit, discarding dummy's ♦7. Your next move should be to go and buy a lottery ticket!

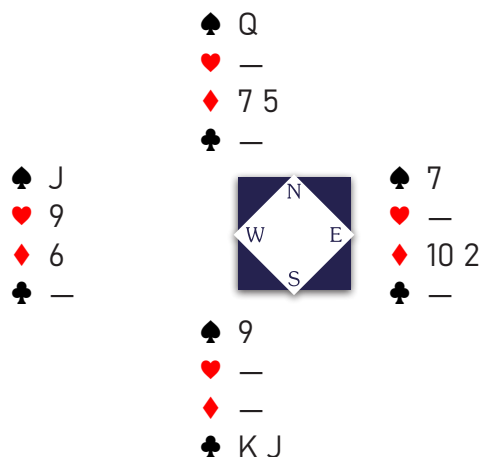
Almost everyone bid a slam on this deal, but four pairs got all the way to 7♥. Their luck was in, the diamond suit providing four tricks to deliver +1510. That was especially useful for Karl Asplund and Sara Sivelind, as the contract in the other room was 4♥.

At this table and the one occupied by Szymon Lubina and Andzelika Petruczenko, the opening lead was a small spade. When declarer tried dummy's ♠J North covered with the ♠Q and in due course declarer ran the ♦9 and emerged with all the tricks.

Now imagine that North's diamonds were headed by the ♦QJ7. When declarer plays the

♦9 North covers and subsequently does the same when declarer plays the ♦8. Now there will only be 12 tricks.

If you decide it is unlikely that South will lead away from the queen at trick one, you should play low from dummy. After winning in hand you draw trumps and play on diamonds. When South shows out on the second round of the suit there is more than one way to get home. Perhaps the prettiest is to cash the ♠A (Vienna Coup), ruff a club and play trumps to reach this ending...



When you present the ♥9 North has no answer.

For the final of the European Online Mixed Teams, the top eight qualifiers from the three-day Swiss met one another for seven rounds of seven boards. There was only an 8-VP range of carryover. It could be anyone's day.

West led his partner's suit, the ♥5 to the 10, jack and king. Declarer took her five club tricks, West playing the 4 then 2 and 10, East discarding the ♦4 8 9 and the ♠4. When South exited with the ♦Q, East won perforce, cashed her top hearts (♦J, ♠5 from West) and then played the ♠Q. When West did not overtake, East had to lead a heart to declarer's 7, and the ♦K was the eighth trick.

After the ♣K lead and ♠A continuation, declarer ruffed and played the ♥A. Seeing the 10 from North, he led low to dummy's 9, holding the trick. Next came a diamond to the ace to force out the ♥K and East was soon claiming 10 tricks, +170 and 7 IMPs for AROMEX.

North led the ♦5 to the king, South continuing with the queen to the 7 and dummy's ace. This looks so easy when you can see all the cards, but understandably declarer felt the need to do something about his club losers. He led the ♣J, taken by South's king, who exited with a trump, declarer's 10 holding the trick. Now came the ♥5 to the 10, jack and king and South gave his partner a ruff. North exited with a spade and now dummy is dead. Declarer tried the ♥A, discarding a club, but North ruffed. Another club was lost for down one.

Clovis Dehaye ruffed the second club and advanced the ♥J, a nice play that smothered the 10. She next led low to the 9, South taking the king, and ruffed the club return. After drawing trumps, she played the ♠Q and another. When the jack fell, she made five for +200 and 6 IMPs to MIXED BELGIUM.

I was surprised at the lack of a Michaels or other two-suited bid at several tables. South led the ♣K, North playing the 3 and East the 2. She exited with a fourth-best spade to the queen

and king. Declarer took a heart finesse, losing to the king, and North played the ♣9, holding, then 8 for down two.

South led a third-best ♥5 to the queen and ace. Declarer advanced the ♣8; 2, 10, ace. The ♥K was ruffed low and the ♣Q covered by the king, North discarding the ♥7. South dutifully led a low club for partner to ruff, but this was the last trick for the defense. East won the diamond return, played the ♠A and another to dummy, pulling trumps and taking two more clubs, a diamond and a spade for 10 tricks, +790 and 12 IMPs. That was their only winning board of the set, but they won the match 12-6.

Say West wins with the ace and plays the ♠J. North must win and play a club, or another spade. West can cash a high spade, but dummy's ♥J prevents the cheap ruff by East.

In the MIXED SIGNALS vs. UKRAINE match, both teams bid and made six: Susanne Kriftner of MIXED SIGNALS got a friendly spade lead; at the other table, North overcalled Sergey Nishy's strong 1♣ opening bid with 2♥, showing either hearts or clubs and spades. Eventually, 6♠ was declared in the West by UKRAINE's Olena Holub, who received the lead of the ♥2. She went up with the ace and finessed South for the ♠Q. Well done for a push board.

A spirited auction and, because technically 4♥ can be made, not a bad decision (and the "par" result), although over South's double I like bidding 3 or 4♦ immediately. South led the ♥J and North won to lead the ♠A, intending to continue for a ruff, which would be down three. After a discouraging ♠8, he played the ♣7, South taking the queen with the ace. He could still get this down three if he leads a spade, but he continued with clubs and down two it was.

Janson did not open this 12-count, and then Alerted his 3♦ raise as preemptive, which possibly made it difficult for declarer to figure out where the high-cards were. She kind of did everything but pull trump and work on clubs and was thus down two for 11 IMPs to MIXED SIGNALS, who at this point were trailing the leaders, MIXED BELGIUM, who had a quiet victory in the last round against LONDON CALLING. MIXED SIGNALS picked up another game swing on the next board. They defeated AROMEX 34-0, landing them in second place.
